A Message from our Teaching Staff

Reiche is partnering with the **Just Read, Portland! Summer Reading Program** and **Portland ConnectED** to encourage children to read during the summer months. You may have heard the term "summer slide" which refers to the fact that children lose newly acquired reading skills if they do not read during the summer. They can lose up to two months of new learning, simply by not reading during the summer months!

We are encouraging all students to continue to grow as readers during the summer months by reading **Just Right** books and by reading together as a family. The term, **Just Right** books, refers to books that are neither too hard, nor too easy. Ms. McDonough, one of Reiche's first grade teachers, will be at Reiche every Monday, June 30th – August 11th, from 1:30-2:30, to help students select just right books. WENA, West End Neighborhood Association, will be opening the **Community Center Book Nook** (just up the ramp) every morning at 8:30 from June 23rd to August 29th. Children are welcome to stop by for a breakfast bag (cereal, energy bar, juice box and fruit) and a book.

All Reiche students, in grades K-4, will be receiving a Tic-Tac-Toe reading log to keep track of the books they read during the summer. (Look for the turquoise sheet with your son or daughter's report card). There is a grade level specific book list on back of the tic-tac-toe reading log. Simply record the books on the tic-tac-toe form. Then return the form to Reiche in September. Students completing the form will receive a certificate and a prize.

Keep those Math Skills Sharp this Summer!

Students have been working hard with the new enVisions math program and have been making great progress. One area where many students need a little more practice is in the area of fact fluency. The common core requires that students know their facts quickly and accurately and at younger grades than in the past. It would be helpful if students could spend a few minutes each day, or at least a couple of times a week, practicing math facts. Many of the games from Math Night can be helpful-especially Tens Go Fish, Snappo, UNO Salute, Close to 21 and Facts Practice. When in the car use the numbers in the license plate ahead of you to practice adding, subtracting, or multiplying. Or punch the numbers into a calculator and try to answer before pressing the = key.

First in Math (www.firstinmath.com) is also good for practicing facts. One way to see if your child knows his or her facts is by taking the Just the Facts quiz (JTF 100) in First in Math. I recommend all children start with addition, and continue to subtraction, and then test themselves in multiplication and division (grades 3 and up). After taking the quiz students can practice with the Power Builders if needed. Students should be trying to get a score of 95% or higher. For most children the login is pps-firstname-lastinitial (ppskarenm) and the password is pps-studentid (pps24680.)

Students in Grades 2-5 can also practice math using IXL (www.IXL.com/signin/reiche) For most students the login is their id/lunchnumber. For all students the password is rch12345. There are many skills for each grade level. It's okay to use a lower or higher grade level if that's a better fit.

I hope students have fun practicing their math facts so they'll be ready to solve more challenging math problems in the fall.

Reiche Green Team News and Summary – 2012/13

Take a walk through Reiche's gardens this week and you'll see lots growing: potatoes, leeks, tomatoes, garlic, kale, corn, sweet potatoes, lavender, peas, mustard, mint, raspberries, blueberries, apples and asparagus.

The plants you see growing are the result of the hard work and care students have put into the garden this year. Through weekly lessons with Cultivating Community, K-5 students spent the spring preparing beds for planting, raising seedlings to transplant and also sowing seeds directly in the garden. We look forward to fall when the plants will be fully grown and Reiche students can enjoy the harvest.

The Reiche Green Team is happy to be a partner in these efforts. This year, the Green Team raised \$1200 through grants and other fundraising efforts including sales of the popular Reiche Rockets T-shirts (designed by Joel Brown). Funds were spent to invest in materials for the school garden, buy perennials for a garden sitting area, and make a major upgrade in garden tools to support our work.

Along with extending the reach of the classroom to the outdoors, the Reiche Garden has been host to many visitors this spring. In May, the garden drew over 50 workday volunteers to help repair the Clark St. stump circle, move beds and create new planting areas, amend soil with compost, weed, rake, mulch and remove garbage and debris.

We also celebrated our first school-wide Garden Day—an all-day event where students enjoyed activities hosted by Garbage to Garden, Whole Foods, Pastor Chuck's Applesauce, Cumberland County Master Gardeners, Spiral Tree Yoga and Portland Schools' Central Kitchen. Kids were thrilled to spend time outside while making their own seed balls, sampling and voting on apple varieties, tasting fruits and vegetables in all colors of the rainbow, and learning about preserving food, among other activities.

In June, the garden hosted a group from the Quimby Family Foundation and Portland Trails. These are two organizations which have funded our garden and greening efforts in the past, and which look at the Reiche gardens as a model among area schools. The visit gave us a great opportunity to showcase our outdoor learning spaces and explain what an asset they are to our school and to our neighborhood.

Summer can be a hard time for Reiche's gardens, and the Green Team reaches out this time of year for help keeping them watered and healthy. This year, we are excited to have summer school students using and caring for the gardens while they study. We also have many families who have each volunteered to return as summer garden stewards for a week.
